Happy New Year! We hope you had a wonderful break and that 2025 has started well for you and your family. We are delighted to start the new year by sharing a new selection of books. Hopefully some of the texts within these pages will capture the interest of your child – as always, we have tried to cover a range of interests and accessibility so that there is hopefully something for everyone.

Reading is so important for our young people: it provides so many benefits to support them in school, such as aiding vocabulary development, supporting access to the wider curriculum and therefore raising outcomes – but it also has proven benefits for life beyond school, including supporting mental wellbeing.

You may have seen in the news that the National Literacy Trust published their report into Children and Young People's Reading in 2024 in November. It shows, by far, the lowest level of reading enjoyment that they have recorded since they started measuring this in 2005. The decrease in the number of young people enjoying reading is also the steepest decline seen. Just 1 in 3 children aged 8-18 years old said that they enjoyed reading in their free time and only 1 in 5 said that they read daily in their free time. In light of the benefits we know reading provides for young people, this is sad to see.

The books shared here are obviously a selection and are by no means an exhaustive list - but we do hope that some of these may help ignite, or continue to support, your child's enjoyment of reading. If you'd like to encourage and support your child with reading and exploring a variety of texts, you may wish to consider some of the tips below:

- Share the selection of books in this newsletter and see if any capture their interest.
- **Visit a book shop or library** and browse the shelves or ask the librarian/shop assistant what they'd recommend, based on your child's interests. Whatever they're interested in, there will be texts out there related to what they enjoy!
- Remember that reading in any form is positive graphic novels and comics etc. They don't have to pick up a novel!
- Listening is also reading! Audiobooks are a great way to support students who may lack confidence in their reading ability or are reluctant to pick up a book.
- Talk to them about what they're reading maybe even read (or listen!) along with them!
- Carve out time to allow your child the space to engage in reading. Life is busy and there are so many distractions that can pull us away from doing things like reading help your child to carve out time to do so, without making it a chore. For example, perhaps you could plan time where they can sit quietly with a book and a hot chocolate or snack of their choice.
- If they struggle with reading, speak to their school and make sure they're aware. They'll be able to advise you on how best to support your child, based on their needs.

Please note that unless otherwise stated, the texts shared within this newsletter are suitable from Year 7 and up, but please do research the books before selecting them to ensure that they are appropriate for your child, as these are just a publisher's guide.

We do hope this newsletter helps you and your child start to rekindle, or continue, your enjoyment of reading in 2025!



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SHORTER-LENGTH READS





Eleven-year-old Lori is home alone for the first time in her life and she's immediately done all the things she's TOTALLY NOT allowed to do:


- 1. Turned the heating up to the max

KWAMF ALEXANDER




Wild East




a world he's never considered before. Rap is like spoken word: bars equal poetry - and maybe the combination of both could be the key to achieving his dreams.

Movies Showing Nowhere


YORICK GOLDEWIJK




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JANUARY 27TH IS HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

The Red Ribbon


LUCY ADLINGTON




100 Things to Know About History

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Survival in Space: The Apollo 13 Mission


DAVID LONG

What is consent? Why is it important? and other big questions LOUISE SPILSBURY & YAS NECATI



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Raise Your Voice: Make Yourself Heard in a Noisy World


